**Reading Rampage** is an amazing opportunity to take part in a reading challenge especially designed for secondary students in Years 7 and 8, which is aimed at boosting the profile of reading by creating a buzz around reading across the school.

The project runs from January 2024 to June 2024 and aims to inspire and motivate students to be active and enthusiastic readers who read by choice, for pleasure.

Along the way, we will be introducing students to 10 great books and their amazing authors. Online sessions in school with this year's shortlisted authors will help students to engage with the books and their authors on a different level.

The book judged to be most borrowed/read and the book judged to be the most highly rated by participating students will be announced at a special online awards event in June 2024.

Year 7 students were very excited to receive their Book Trust **Bookbuzz** book this month.

Bookbuzz is a reading programme from Book Trust that aims to help schools inspire a love of reading in students aged 11 to 13. Participating schools give their students the opportunity to choose their own book to take home and keep from a list of 17 titles. They are all carefully selected by a panel of experts to ensure quality, suitability and to encourage reading for pleasure.







We have gone all out on the winter theme in the library this half term. There have been specially selected books on display, as well as a range of House competitions that have seen students making snowflakes, snowmen and Christmas baubles.

#### **Speak Up Programme**

Since September, a number of committed, keen drama students have been working on the Speak Up project in conjunction with both the Curve Theatre in Leicester and The National Theatre in London.

Speak Up is a national project which is designed to give young people a voice to talk about things that matter to them.

On Wednesday, 6<sup>th</sup> December, the Speak Up students travelled to the Curve after school to take part in their Speak Up workshop with our Speak Up representative, Ben Johnson. Barbed wire so thick, tan tracks like a brick.


No Man's Land a cursed sight, there is no light.

The committee has several new members, who are all excited to get underway with this year's projects. They started the year busily working on the 23/24 action plan and reorganising the Eco Committee display board in school, which lets the Soar Valley community know what's going on.

For 23/24 the committee have chosen the topics of Biodiversity, School Grounds and Marine as their key areas of focus. Some might wonder why the topic of Marine is on the agenda for this year when we live nowhere near the sea! Well, protecting and conserving water-based ecosystems falls into this topic. Therefore, the committee plan to improve the water-based ecosystems close to the school by cleaning local streams and pathways along the River Soar from rubbish/plastic waste.

The big plan for the topics of Biodiversity and School Grounds is to make improvements to the wellbeing garden enabling the space to be used more as an outdoor learning area and to provide a greater opportunity for diverse species to thrive.

The team will also continue to be involved in other activities started last year. For example they will continue working with Terracycle to recycle various items to gain school funds. They will also re-enter the annual Leicester School's Mealbarrow competition and become involved in other small projects that come their way!
