
A new reading reward scheme and more competitions!

# **Anti-Bullying Ambassadors Update**



Last year our Anti- Bullying Ambassadors gained accreditation from the Diana Trust for their Anti-Bullying work. They shared their success with all students in assemblies during the Anti-Bullying week on the 14<sup>th</sup> November. They spoke to students about how bullying affects millions of lives and can leave us feeling hopeless but, if we challenge it, we can change it, and it starts by reaching out.

The theme of the week was 'Reach Out'. In assembly the message was clear, anti-bullying awareness doesn't stop with young people. Reach out by being the change you want to see. It takes courage, but it can change lives.

During the week a large number of students came together and took part in numerous anti-bullying activities to help raise awareness. On Thursday lunchtime, students met in the library to make friendship bracelets and to do some mindfulness colouring. To round up the week, 35 students came to an Into Film Club celebrating 'Friendships' and 'Reaching Out' to view the film 'Luca'.

# **Active Citizenship**



As part of the 'Active Citizenship' element of their course, Year 11 GCSE Citizenship students have organised and led activities after school at Vista's New Wycliffe Home.

The students started their active citizenship projects by interviewing two members of staff from the Wycliffe Home to assess the needs of the residents before planning activities for them. Students then spent lessons and much of their own time planning and making activities which ranged from bingo and quizzes to food tasting and tea parties. Students have forged meaningful links with the Home and integrated with residents, which is what they initially set out to do.

# The SVC Eco Team



The SVC Eco Team is up and running again this term. Students from across Years 7-9 volunteered to be part of the important task of getting Soar Valley reaccredited as a Green Flag Eco-School this academic year. Working with the global educational programme, Eco-Schools England, the Eco Team are leading initiatives in school to make us more environmentally friendly. This year's focus will be on healthy living, global citizenship and waste.

Examples of the work conducted by the Eco Team this half term include:

- Conducted a review of the plastic bottles of water sold during a school day over break and lunch. A phenomenal
  amount of 273 was recorded. This review has enabled two students from the group to meet with the G4S site
  manager to lobby for recycled bottle bins to be placed within school.
- Conducted a review of the number of students who bring a sustainable water bottle to school and those who either bring in a bottle that is not sustainable or no bottle at all. Many do not have a sustainable water bottle and so the team now plan to campaign for all students to be issued with one, so there is less plastic to recycle.
- Met with the G4S site manager to see how much food waste there is at SVC. The site manager informed the team that there were 1.03 tonnes of food waste during the month of October. The team now plan to meet with the catering team to look at ways of reducing the food waste. They are also planning to work with the House teams to collate dry food/cans which equate to the amount of food waste we had in October and give it to a local food bank.

There are lots more activities that the Eco Team plan to get involved with next term including visiting and working with a local food bank, visiting a waste recycling plant to gain an insight into the work they do, 'Earth Day' and work within the outdoor spaces at SVC.

# **Geography Fieldtrips Return!**

All Year 11 Geography classes enjoyed a day out at the seaside to carry out their GCSE fieldwork requirements. Our new fieldwork location at Hunstanton, North Norfolk provided the opportunity for our students to carry out both their physical and human fieldwork components and proved to be a really valuable day out.



In the morning, students were able to see coastal processes and management strategies at work, carrying out a range of data collection methods on Hunstanton beach. This included calculating the direction and speed of longshore drift and evaluating the effectiveness of the groynes in trapping sediment on the beach. Despite wet and muddy shoes, we were then able to collect data to help assess the urban sustainability of Hunstanton in the afternoon.

Students represented the school extremely well and we were also able to share our Soar Valley Way on our travels!

It's been another busy term in PE with lots of extra curricular sport on offer, as well as some very special opportunities for students to step out of their comfort zone and do great things!

When Tom died, his expanding cracker business was taken over by his three sons, one of whom introduced the idea of hats in the crackers. He also travelled the world looking for ideas for gifts to put in the crackers. There were special crackers for occasions, such as coronations. The British Royal family still has special crackers made for them today!
