# **Message from the Principal**

I write this as COVID-19 guidance changes across the country, which will have an impact on how we operate as a school. The key changes are as follows:

- Masks will no longer be compulsory in communal areas. The vast majority of students will probably choose to still wear a mask each day, and we would encourage this, but will no longer be supplying masks for those who do not have them.
- There is no longer a requirement for twice weekly Covid tests, and schools will no longer be receiving test kits to give out.
- There is also no requirement to self-isolate following a positive test result. However the advice is still to stay at home for at least 5 days and until there are two negative test results on consecutive days.
- Close contacts who are not vaccinated no longer need to self-isolate.
- Close contacts will no longer be expected to test for 7 days.

To keep us all healthy and safe, the main thing is that if students feel unwell, they should stay at home until they feel better, stay away from others and are advised to wear a mask.

As a school, we have sailed through the COVID storm successfully, and this is in part due to the fantastic attitudes of students, who have adhered so well to the measures we have put in place, and also to parents, who have supported us, for example, by providing face coverings. We will keep several measures in place for some time to come, in order to keep as many students and staff in school as we can, including separate areas for year groups, the one-way system, hand sanitiser in each classroom.



This term we have been working with Sustrans, the charity promoting sustainable methods of transport, on encouraging students to find more environmentally friendly ways to get to school.


Sustrans have created maps of cycling and walking routes to Soar Valley showing the time it will take to get to school.

It has been a busy half term for Careers Education at Soar Valley College. Year 11 students have now submitted their Post 16 applications and tutors' references are complete. They will now begin to hear about college interviews and welcome events.

Following our apprenticeship webinar in September, we were pleased to welcome back Project Ask last month to deliver a short workshop to students who wanted further support with how to apply for an apprenticeship. Nav from Project Ask was able to get students logged on to The National Apprenticeship Service website, help students to search for vacancies and talk them through the application process and what to expect as an apprentice.

Kicking off our latest round of careers talks in January was Andrew Bernard from Innovative Enterprise. "Bernie" spoke with students about his journey, his failures at school and how he got his life back on track. He gave his top tips to our KS4 students on self-motivation and resilience.

Grace Moronfolou from The Crown Prosecution Service joined us at the end of January and worked with students from Year 9 to Year 11. Grace got our budding lawyers to look at case studies and gather evidence. It was a great session with brilliant, insightful questions asked by our students.
