STEM Challenge

Year 7 have been set a STEM activity on Satchel:One to build their own 'Energy Town'.

Year 10 Active Citizenship: International Group

On Friday 9th February, John Coster, a guest speaker came to speak to 55 Year 10 students on the subject of activism and journalism, which is linked to their International Citizenship project.

John Coster works for the Documentary Media Centre in Leicester and is a prominent member of the community working to promote awareness of international affairs. He works on the Parallel Lives Project and has many links with international charities working within Leicester.

In addition to his visit, John is offering the chance for a small group of students to take part in a 'news day' to create media content and work as journalists and documentarians as part of their volunteering project.





Geography Fieldwork

As part of our Year 7 fieldwork, students have been conducting a traffic survey on Gleneagles Avenue in order to investigate whether the *Safer Streets Healthier Neighbourhood* scheme introduced by Leicester City Council has been effective at reducing traffic congestion.

Primary data collection has been an integral part of this geographical enquiry and the Geography Department would like to thank parents, family and friends for supporting their Year 7 child by completing the recent questionnaire with their opinions on the Council's Safer Streets Campaign. We've had a fantastic response and we are now collating the data in the classroom.

MFL Spelling Bee

The Modern Foreign Languages team are once again offering students the chance to take part in the Links into Languages spelling bee. The winners from Stage 1 have been practising for their Stage 2 competition which will take place on Friday 1st March.

Students have been putting in lots of hard work in lunchtime sessions and after school so that they can be in with a chance to progress to Stage 3 and compete in the regional final at the University of Nottingham. It's great to see such enthusiasm for learning languages amongst the students.



Eco Club Update

The Eco Club have had a busy half term as they have been working on the targets set out in this year's action plan. During the first two meetings of the term the students created and painted a home-made bird bath from old garden pots which were lying unused in the school allotment and set out basil, mint and parsley seeds to grow in small pots in preparation for the allotment work which will take place in the new term when the warmer weather comes along. Some of the team have been selling cakes at parents' evenings to raise funds for the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) charity and we will continue to do this throughout the rest of the academic year.

The upcoming term will see some students taking part in a litter picking activity at Watermead Country Park which will help towards a target set within the topic of marine life.





Also, as part of the marine life topic the students will be making fish out of plastic bottles and creating an artivism piece to show the damage that plastic can do to fish in the ocean.

The team are really looking forward to getting outdoors to do lots of planting of fruit and vegetables in the allotment to grow and sell in order to raise more money for the WWF. They have already been outdoors into the Ecology Garden this year to create a small log pile to help insect habitats as the spring months approach.

Speak Up!

In the Drama department, The Speak Up Project continues to be an invaluable extracurricular opportunity for students involved.

Working in conjunction with The National Theatre and Curve Theatre, the aim of Speak Up is to give young people a voice about issues which matter to them. Speak Up is in its second year and we are so pleased to be able to continue this project throughout this academic year. Students work weekly with visiting artist, Ben Johnson, who helps students to navigate through their ideas and thoughts and turn them into practice.

Following the success of our visit to Curve Theatre, students have written and recorded a song and are now working with local playwright Jayne Williams to write a script to support their work.

Speak Up continues to run every Wednesday from 3pm – 4pm in G9.

All students experienced an apprenticeship assembly, a morning registration activity, and the chance to ask questions to our providers. Year 7 and Year 8 were introduced to apprenticeships by Sergeant Guy Bufton from The Army. Guy explained apprenticeships to students and talked through the wide range that are available.

Rahul Lakhani from SMB College Group came to talk to Year 9 students. Acknowledging this crucial part in the Year 9 education journey as students embark upon their GCSE Option choices, Rahul was able to talk about learning styles and link this to the apprenticeship model as a valuable option at Post 16 and beyond.

We were very pleased to welcome back ex-student Navjoyt Kaur from Work Pays to talk to our KS4 students about apprenticeships. Navjoyt spoke about apprenticeships at all levels equipping students with key information about the benefits of an apprenticeship at any stage of their education journey.

Following the assemblies, we provided four workshops, delivered in conjunction with Connexions, for KS4 students. These workshops enabled students who had expressed an interest in apprenticeships to learn more about the application process and the reality of being an apprentice. They proved to be so popular with our students that we will be arranging additional sessions later in the spring term.
