Students have been challenged to write a story in 100 words or fewer inspired by numbers.


Murder by the Book

The students have all worked really hard to produce colourful and functional items.
















Saw Club - Block Bots

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Year 10 Food Preparation and Nutrition students have been the lucky recipients of wild Alaskan pink salmon to use during their practical lessons, in a bid to improve their fish cookery skills.

The initiative is part of the 'Fish In School Hero' programme which is run by the Food Teachers Centre, in partnership with the Alaska Seafood Marketing Institute.

The programme aims to ensure that every child gets a chance to prepare, cook and eat fish before they leave school. Students gained knowledge and developed a range of technical skills whilst making some delicious salmon fishcakes.

- 3rd prize was awarded to Kavya Bharatkumar in 7.1 for his model city and the balance achieved between people and conservation.


Maths Feast 2023
