FUNNY IS POWER







World Book Day

On 3rd March Soar Valley celebrated World Book Day. This was the 25th year of the event which celebrates everything about reading for pleasure. As well as the craft and writing activities on offer in the library, staff got involved by taking photos of their home bookshelves and filming themselves reading from favourite books while wearing masks. It was up to the students to deduce the owners of the shelves and work out the identities of the Masked Readers!

On World Book Day itself, some staff members dressed up as famous book characters and had to find their pair – another character from the same book! Congratulations to the Year 10 students who managed to spot and correctly identify all the characters around the school throughout the day.

Students also received their World Book Day token to spend in bookshops, and those in Key Stage 3 had the chance to look at some of this year's special £1 World Book Day titles in their library lessons.



Author Visit for Year 7

In February, Year 7 students were treated to a talk from Savita Kalhan, author of *That Asian Kid*. Savita spoke to the whole year group about her reading habits, her writing, and what it takes to become an author. Before becoming a writer, Savita was an English teacher but she revealed that this didn't stop her from writing a 600,000 word epic fantasy story... by hand!

That Asian Kid has been shortlisted for various prizes and won the Warwickshire 9 Book Award 2020, and students were able to hear Savita read an extract from it. After the talk, a group of students were able to meet Savita and get her autograph.

In other news...

There are two book awards currently running across the school. Reading Rampage is continuing for Year 7 and Year 8 and students have until the end of May to read the 12 nominated books and vote for their winner. Students who complete reviews of the chosen books will earn points for their house. Beacon are currently in the lead – but will they stay there?

This term we have also launched our book clubs at lunchtimes, and for the next couple of months attendees will be shadowing the Carnegie Medal. This famous book award has a shortlist of 8 books, and students taking part will be asked to vote for a winner in May. We will also have regular discussions and debates about these books leading up to the vote! Junior Book Club (for Year 7 and Year 8) runs on Monday lunchtimes, and Senior Book Club (for Year 9 and above) is on Wednesday lunchtimes. There is still time to take part and any interested students can find out more in the library.

Finally, we have been able to expand the library's opening times. Students can now use the library for choosing books and quiet study before school every day from 8am, after school until 4pm, and throughout the week at selected break and lunchtimes. Importantly, this means Years 9 and above have access to the library for revision every lunchtime – and we have copies of important revision guides to borrow too.



This year our librarian Ms Codling is a regional judge for the Carnegie Medal, a prestigious literary award dating all the way back to 1936 and previously won by such authors as Anne Fine, Philip Pullman and Terry Pratchett. Our Creative Writing Club interviewed her to find out more...



Q: What inspired you to become a judge for the Carnegie Greenaway Award?

A: I worked with a brilliant librarian who was a previous judge and she encouraged me to take part in the judging process.

Q: Have you judged any other competitions or awards? A: No, this is my first year as a judge.

Q: Are you paid to be a judge?

A: No, there is no salary, so you really need to be someone who likes reading a lot of books.

Q: What do you think makes a good judge?

A: As I say, you need to really enjoy reading, be excited about the competition, and have lots of time available to tackle the longlist.

Q: How do you get hold of the 148 nominated books? A: The publishers send them directly to my house.

Q: Where do you keep all of these books?

A: I have a set of shelves especially for them. I put them on the shelf with their spine facing the wall and turn them round once I've read them – this way I can easily see how much progress I'm making!

Q: What is the longest nominated book?

A: The longest book is about five hundred pages.

Q: Who nominates the books for the award?

A: The books are all nominated by librarians.

Q: What are your favourite genres to read? Did this influence your decision as a judge?

A: I am a big fan of books centring on real life issues and modern events, but as I judge I have to keep an open mind and I'm enjoying reading books I wouldn't usually choose.

Q: Is there a genre of you dislike?

A: I'm not really a fan of fantasy, I prefer more realistic fiction.

Q: How do you decide which books should be longlisted and shortlisted?

A: The judges email each other and are having conversations all the time. We generally decide whether a book is a 'yes', a 'no', or a 'maybe', and go from there.

Q: How do you decide what makes a Carnegie Greenaway Award-winning book?

A: We're actually sent a very detailed list of criteria to help us decide. You need to read the whole book before you make a judgment and then decide if it meets the criteria.

Q: Was there a book which you liked that wasn't nominated for the award?

A: Yes, I was really surprised that 'The Outrage' by William Hussey wasn't nominated.

Q: Do you have a favourite book that you think should win the award?

A: Unfortunately that information is top secret – judges have to keep all opinions amongst themselves until the winner is announced.


A huge thank you to Ms Codling for allowing us a look behind the scenes of such a prestigious award and the judging process involved in picking a winner.
